


# SECRETARY'S REPORT

Ladies,

At the conclusion of my report last year I asked that all members pull together to make 1979 as successful a season as 1978 had been. In this the 47th year of our Association I can only say this was certainly carried out. The season was, if possible, more successful than the last with exciting hockey; excellent results from representative teams; witnessing of the Interstate Championship in Brisbane; selection of two Brisbane players in the Australian team which acquitted itself so well in Canada, and finally the winning of the Sportswoman of the Year by Miss. Pam Glossop. What Association could ask for more! The only aspect which marred the season was the lack of rain resulting in poor field surfaces, but we did not have that on our own.

Since our last Annual Meeting, incoming Office Bearers were treated to a Christmas outing which was enjoyed by all who attended.

February saw the commencement of training for most clubs and the first Executive meeting was held on 6th February at which the format for the season was laid down. It was decided to utilise to the full the time available to us on Downey Park so it was set down that scheduled fixtures (three full rounds) would not cease for Senior or Under 19 Interstate championships, except in the case of these championships or International games, being held in Brisbane. Fixtures commenced on 7th April and concluded with Grand finals on 8th September. Four Sunday fixtures were played with only 2 Saturdays out for the senior Interstate and the State Championships in Gympie. During that time 8 delegate and 10 Executive meetings were held. The Junior section also held regular monthly meetings and a full report by the Junior Secretary follows later in this report.

It was our intention to run a loosers round to give all players a full season of hockey. Unfortunately, the seniors found that time beat us with players who work on a Saturday morning finding it impossible to commence games earlier than normal - remembering that extra time has to be allowed in semi-finals and finals and it was felt that staggering of the games would result in quite an amount of confusion. The juniors were not worried by this factor so were able to carry out a loosers round.

Opening Day saw clubs running stalls, which not only helped their finances but gave the day a festive atmosphere.

During the season a number of representative teams were selected by both Junior and Senior Selection Committees. All personnel of these teams were assisted financially in some way, as were the players selected to represent the State in seniors and under 19 teams and Australian team.

#### Wide Bay Carnival - Maryborough - May

Senior, Under 19 and Under 16 teams participated in this carnival and as usual a very enjoyable week-end was had by all. The senior team defeated Bundaberg, drew with Maryborough and were defeated 3-1 by the Queensland team which participated in the carnival. The Under 19 team were undefeated drawing with Maryborough and defeating Bundaberg & Gympie. The Under 16's fate was not so bright and they sustained 22 defeates but were successful in beating Hervey Bay.

#### Interstate - Brisbane - May

Association member were delighted to be able to witness a week of Interstate hockey played at Finsbury Park. Clubs hosted State teams and members assisted the Q.W.H.A. in many spheres. Our congratulations to Q.W.H.A. on a well run championship and also to the Brisbane players who participated. Congratulations must also be extended to Pam Glossop and Julene Sunderland who were selected to represent Australia.

#### Under 14 Carnival - Maryborough - May

The Under 14 team aquitted itself very well with 4 wins and 5 losses. We might point out that on the first day the girls played 1 game and on days 2, 3 and 4 played 3 games per day - a tall order for any age group!!

#### State Championships - Gympie - June

As usual all players and officials thoroughly enjoyed the State Championships. The first team brought home the bacon - well half anyway - as they drew the championship with Townsville. They defeated Cairns, Rockhampton, Brisbane 11; drew Bundaberg & Townsville. The seconds were in no way disgraced by defeating Maryborough and Gold Coast; drew with Bundaberg and lost only to the winners Townsville and Brisbane 1. Congratulations to players who were selected in the Under 19 State team, and the Senior 1980 squad.

#### Secondary Schoolgirls Carnival - Cairns - August

By the reports given on the carnival it was a very happy experience for all. B.W.H.A. can be very proud of these girls both on and off the field. The first team had four wins over Mackay, Rockhampton, Gold Coast and Cairns and three losses to Maryborough, Townsville and Ipswich. The second team defeated Gold Coast, drew with the Sunshine Coast, Gladstone and Cairns and lost only to Gympie. Well done girls. Congratulations to June Struck for being selected in the best 17 and to Dagmar Carstens for aquiring her State C badge during the carnival.

#### UMPIRES! CONVENER'S REPORT

Our first Umpires' Board Meeting was held in March, before the season began and it was decided, because of heavy commitments to organising the National Tournament in May, that no full testing would be attempted until this was completed. Meantime, a programme for beginner umpires was planned, this consisting of two morning seminars. The first, held in late April, was purely theoretical and was well attended by the selected aspiring umpires. This same group was then invited to take part in a practical session, conducted with the co-operation of players from Commercial, Easts and Bulimba clubs who sent teams to play in short practise games for one full Sunday morning. Special thanks to the three clubs for making themselves available for this seminar, and to Mrs. Langan for her help in conducting it. I hope that similar ventures for higher badged umpires may be attempted in future seasons.

The pre-examination rules discussion was very well attended, and sixty-two candidates sat for the Umpires' Theory Exam in June. The results are listed below. The second half of the season was spent in testing and coaching umpires for the higher badges in fixture games and all members of the Board are to be thanked for their time and effort spent in performing this duty. Many umpires showed great potential, but I must again stress that badges are not awarded merely for performing your duty. An umpire must be prepared to work diligently at improving her own standard, and as with playing, should take every opportunity to gain experience in officiating whenever possible. Candidates successful in practical tests are named later in this report.

I would like to thank Nan Mauchlan for offering to take over my duties for the last six weeks of the season, a very busy period indeed, when I was in Canade officiating at the World Hockey Tournament. Her gesture was greatly appreciated. I would also like to thank all members of the Umpiring Board for the help and cooperation given to me this season, and the players and umpires who so willingly accepted their umpiring responsibilities.

In conclusion I would like to express my disappointment and concern with the general lack of interest and enthusiasm in all spheres of umpiring this year. This began with the absence of any nomination for the position of Umpiring Steward, which resulted in the Umpires' Convener being obliged to carry out the duties of both positions, and continued through to lack of attendance at Umpires' meetings. I hope this attitude is only a temporary one, and that enthusiasm and interest will re-kindle again with the resumption of hockey in 1980, for believe me, we do have great potential here in Brisbane. It is becomming increasingly difficult to umpire hockey with the modern attitudes which are developing towards the game, but it provides a tremendous challenge to all of us, and more and more is it evident that our standard of play is reflected in, and closely linked to, our standard of umpiring. Please let us have dedication in both in 1980.
